The University's Graduate Attributes and seven Generic Intended Learning Outcomes (GILOs) represent the attributes of ideal EdUHK graduates and their expected qualities respectively. Learning outcomes work coherently at the University (GILOs), programme (Programme Intended Learning Outcomes) and course (Course Intended Learning Outcomes) levels to achieve the goal of nurturing participants with important graduate attributes.

In gist, the Graduate Attributes for Sub-degree, Undergraduate, Taught Postgraduate, Professional Doctorate and Research Postgraduate students consist of the following three domains (i.e. in short "PEER & I"):

- Professional Excellence;
- Ethical Responsibility; &
- Innovation.

The descriptors under these three domains are different for the three groups of participants in order to reflect the respective level of Graduate Attributes.

The seven GILOs are:

- 1. Problem Solving Skills
- 2. Critical Thinking Skills
- 3. Creative Thinking Skills
- 4a. Oral Communication Skills
- 4b. Written Communication Skills
- 5. Social Interaction Skills
- 6. Ethical Decision Making
- 7. Global Perspectives

1. Course Synopsis

This course introduces participants to the underlying principles of research methods and methodology in personal finance education. It aims to equip participants with research skills, both qualitative and quantitative, to investigate problems in personal finance education. Learning topics include questionnaire and interview design, data collection, statistical analysis tools (e.g., multiple regression, F-tests, least-squares estimation, collinearity, time series analysis, etc.), and thematic analysis. The modes of delivery are mainly lectures, including computer lab sessions. The computer lab sessions are used to support practical learning of the concepts and tools delivered in the lectures. Participants are expected to apply the research skills in investigating into local as well as global issues in personal finance education after the completion of the course.

2. Course Intended Learning Outcomes (CILO_s)

Upon completion of this course, participants will be able to:

- CILO₁ identify, develop and justify a research topic of interest that is relevant and important;
- CILO₂ apply research skills in a research project, including systematic review and critical appraisal, acquired in this course;
- CILO₃ employ research ethics and the underlying principles in research;
- CILO₄ critically evaluate the findings and formulate a research report with critical insights and implications.
