### Part II

## 1. Course Synopsis

This course aims to equip students with the theoretical framework to examine the international politics in Asia amidst the rise of China. With China's growing economic strength and political influence, neighbouring states as well as countries in other regions have to redefine their strategies to deal with their common interests as well as conflicts with their neighbours. The course will focus on the following questions: 1) How mainstream theoretical perspective explains the international politics in Asia? 2) How the rise of China reshapes the relationship among Asian countries? 3) What are the institutional frameworks that facilitate regional cooperation and resolve potential conflicts in East Asia? 4) What are the issues and challenges confronts by Asian countries on their way to achieve greater regional integration? The course will first provide the mainstream theoretical perspectives on international relations. It will follow by discussions on various thematic issues and challenges in the regional politics in Asia.
