Part II

The University's Graduate Attributes and seven Generic Intended Learning Outcomes (GILOs) represent the attributes of ideal EdUHK graduates and their expected qualities respectively. 1. Course Synopsis

This course equips students with the necessary tools to express themselves artistically, by exposing them to various painting media and techniques, as well as applying key art theories in contextual investigation. In the process of selecting, implementing and composing visual elements, students will be able to visualize their concepts and facilitate expressions, with various audiences. Painting goes beyond its two-dimensional presentation and is seen as a medium of identity inquiry, artistic pursuit as well as cultural investigation.

2. Course Intended Learning Outcomes (CILOs)

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- CILO₁ demonstrate ability to select, implement, and compose visual elements, perceptual theories, and painting techniques in visualizing their ideas, concepts, expressions, and intentions;
- CILO₂ develop visual aspects of experience from art theories to contextual analysis through critical reflections in sketches or visual diary;
- CILO₃ articulate painting techniques and concepts with interpretive views of local, national and global context;
- CILO₄ produce series of theme-based paintings for expression and identity inquiry; and
- CILO₅ Demonstrate ability to apply and transfer learned knowledge and skills of painting to teach in school and community.
