1. Course Synopsis

This course analyzes the Cold War by examining both the deep rifts caused by the conflict and the integral attempts to repair these rifts through international cooperation. We explore the Cold War in detail, moving from the end of World War II to the collapse of the Soviet Union and the post-Cold War. We also analyze the institutions and norms created to manage the worst effects of conflict, from the United Nations and regional alliances (such as Bandung and the EU) to NGOs and corporations. The course takes a global perspective throughout, considering the actions and interests not only of the superpowers but also of non-aligned states and ordinary people. Through this survey of the key events, people, and ideas of the postwar period, students thus will gain a broader understanding of the Cold War's history and lasting impact.

2. Course Intended Learning Outcomes (CILOs)

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- CILO₁ Define and interrelate the major events and trends of the Cold War, including the institutions and norms of international cooperation;
- CILO₂ Relate events around the world to the Cold War, examining the interaction of superpowers' influences with local historical forces including in Hong Kong;
- CILO₃ Articulate relationships between primary documents and historical patterns; relate individual viewpoints to national and international dynamics; and
- CILO₄ Perform in-depth historical research using multiple methods of information-gathering and analysis.
