Reflections on capacity building programmes on Greening TVET

BACKGROUND

An era of interconnected challenges.

Countries have officially committed to achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) by 2030 and continue to expand the education sector's capacity for this purpose. Despite encouraging efforts, several challenges still need to be addressed. Most countries struggle to make significant progress towards achieving the SDGs and leverage the vast potential of education and training (SDG 4) to advance economic growth and decent work (SDG 8) and climate action (SDG 13).

Education, training, and lifelong learning can play a crucial role in fighting climate change, as they can equip students and learners with the knowledge, skills, attitudes, and mindset necessary to reduce carbon emissions, manage resources more efficiently, tackle biodiversity loss, and move towards more sustainable modes of production and consumption.

The transition towards greener economies heightens the necessity for adaptability, lifelong learning, skills development, and the attainment of new competencies. The ever-increasing need to empower learners and youth to support sustainable development is further intensified by multiple transitions accentuated by the dual digital and green transformation, demographic and technological change, economic upheaval, the spread of informal employment, and societal and political issues. Additionally, the transition to green and digital economies will also, as a consequence, impact technologies, production, goods and services and increase the demand for workers with up-to-date skills, including green and sustainable competencies.

Capacity building for achieving the SDGs and greening TVET

UNESCO-UNEVOC seeks to foster TVET action to combat climate change and reflect this in the programmes and activities of TVET institutions in the UNEVOC Network. With its programme team on SDGs and Greening TVET and strategic action to foster active engagement of UNEVOC Centres coordinated by the UNEVOC Network Secretariat, UNESCO-UNEVOC leads efforts to advance the agenda on strengthening TVET for climate action as one of the priorities of the UNEVOC Medium Term Strategy III (2021-2023). Various programmes have been implemented to enhance the capacities and competencies of TVET institutions and professionals in TVET (decision-makers, leaders, educators, and researchers) in the form of leadership training, capacity building and training of trainers. In 2021, teachers and trainers were supported through the UNEVOC Network Coaction Initiative, UNESCO-UNEVOC TVET Leadership



<u>Programme 2022</u> and implementation of <u>Training of Trainers</u> to mainstream circular economy approaches in TVET.

The UNEVOC Network Coaction Initiative strengthens the institutional capacities of UNEVOC Centres by implementing TVET projects designed by and for UNEVOC Centres with technical and financial support from UNESCO-UNEVOC. The pilot edition of the initiative supported the Education University of Hong Kong in addressing the SDGs through Curriculum and Pedagogy Innovation in TVET. This training programme was developed to strengthen TVET educators' and leaders' knowledge on understanding the issues relevant to greening industries (and how these can be used in curriculum development) and greening TVET. In addition to this, it aimed to support their capacity building on curriculum and pedagogy innovation for the development of students' green skills.

Objectives

The webinar will take stock of the critical developments and actions taken in TVET to support TVET for climate action and share essential lessons from implementation, new theories of change, and opportunities for implementation. Participants at the webinar will:

- Review progress and disseminate the results and impact of the UNEVOC Network Coaction Initiative on TVET greening practices of participating institutions.
- Share case examples of current strategies and new theories of change in the areas of skills anticipation, curriculum development, and green institutional transformation.
- Foster learning on identification and transfer of sustainability competencies and pedagogical solutions to deliver training for green and circular economy transition.
- Provide further guidance on future support and programme action areas.
