

全球城市圓桌會議 Global City Roundtable




The Academy of Hong Kong Studies (AHKS) adopted the strategic direction of "Hong Kong in the World" in driving the development of Hong Kong Studies. Hong Kong is always a global city facing the whole world and therefore one of the effective ways to pursue Hong Kong Studies is to position Hong Kong within the context of inter-global city studies; by doing so, on the one hand we could make a contribution to international scholarly literature by theorizing Hong Kong as a case study of global city, while on the other hand we could enrich local discussion by transferring international experiences to Hong Kong. The Global City Roundtable is a strategic initiative which aims at fulfilling our mission to examine Hong Kong-centric subjects within the context of inter-global city studies.

The Global City Roundtable aims at providing a platform for informed discussions for academics, experts and policy stakeholders from different global cities. The Roundtable this year will be held in one day, addressing the topic of Middle-class Professionals in Global Cities. The roundtable includes "Academic Dialogue", with a view to foster multi-stakeholder discussions on the topic of "Global cities as international organizations center".





Adopting the strategic direction of "*Worlding Hong Kong Studies*", the AHKS drives interdisciplinary knowledge creation and transfer initiatives on Hong Kong-centric subjects and fosters the development of a cross-regional Hong Kong Studies research community.

<u>Prof LUI Tai-lok</u> Chair Professor of Hong Kong Studies; Director, The Academy of Hong Kong Studies, The Education University of Hong Kong

呂大樂教授現為香港教育大學(教大)香港社會研究講座教授、香港研究學院總監、大中華研究中心總監及副校長(研究與發展)。

加入教大(前身香港教育學院)前, 呂教授曾任香港大學社會學系教授, 期間並出任社會科學院副院長(2010-2011)及社會學系系主任(2011-2014)。他亦曾任教於香港城市理工學院(1986-1988)及香港中文大學(1988-2009)。呂教授早年畢業於香港大學, 取得文學學士及社會學哲學 碩士學位, 期後於英國牛津大學取得哲學碩士及博士學位。


呂教授的研究範疇廣泛,涵蓋階級分析、經濟社會學、城市社會學和香港社會研究等領域。他一直 熱心參與社會事務,除擔任多個與社會服務有關的志願機構的委員外,亦有出任政府及專業團體的 委員會的工作。

Professor LUI Tai-lok is the Vice President (Research and Development), Chair Professor of Hong Kong Studies and Director of The Academy of Hong Kong Studies at The Education University of Hong Kong.

Prior to joining the University (the then Hong Kong Institute of Education), he was Professor at The University of Hong Kong (HKU) where he also took up the position of Associate Dean at the Faculty of Social Sciences (2010-2011) and the headship of the Department of Sociology (2011-2014). He has taught at Hong Kong City Polytechnic (1986-88) and The Chinese University of Hong Kong (1988-2009). Professor Lui obtained his B.A. and M.Phil. in Sociology at the HKU and then a Master of Philosophy and a Doctor of Philosophy from Oxford University.

Professor Lui has widely researched and published in topics including class analysis, economic sociology, urban sociology, and Hong Kong society. He also actively contributes to the Hong Kong community by serving on various committees in governmental and professional bodies as well as those related to social services over the years.

趙永佳於美國普林斯頓大學取得博士資格,現為香港教育大學社會科學系社會學講座教授、香港教 育大學香港研究學院聯席總監。

研究方向主要是以比較及歷史視野對香港進行社會學研究。其近期研究項目包括教育、社會分層與 不平等、社會運動、文化產業、青年研究、中國傳統醫學等等,當中許多項目對公共政策有所影 響。趙教授也活躍於媒體上政策議題的公共討論。

2009 年至 2016 年他擔任香港教育局及考評局通識科聯合課程委員會主席,負責編寫及修訂高中 通識科課程。近年開展多項青年與教育議題研究,包括高中生畢業後的生涯發展,職業及專業教 育,家庭社經背景對學生高中通識科成績的影響。

Professor Stephen CHIU obtained his doctorate from Princeton University and is currently Chair Professor in the Department of Social Sciences, and Co-Director, The Academy of Hong Kong Studies, The Education University of Hong Kong.

His research interests include development studies, industrial relations, social movements, youth studies, and the comparative study of the East Asian region. His research also covered many different public policy issues under commission by various public and governmental bodies. He is also active in the community through his public services.

He was the Chair of the Curriculum Committee on Liberal Studies (Senior Secondary) from 2009 to 2016, and had served as the Part-time Member of the Central Policy Unit, HKSAR Government, and a member of the Strategic Development Commission, HKSAR Government.

方志恒博士現為香港教育大學(教大)香港研究學院副總監。

加入教大(前身香港教育學院)前·方博士曾任香港城市大學專上學院社會科學部講師。而方博士 在投身學術界之前·曾於 2001 年至 2007 年間在香港政府任行政主任。

方博士研究範疇包括中國影響、地域自治、民主化、管治和預算政治。他曾於多份國際學術期刊發 表論文,例如《民主化》、《民族和民族主義》、《國際行政科學評論》、《中國季刊》、《近代中國》和 《亞洲調查》等等。2019 年,方博士的研究項目〈比較自治政體:探索新的比較政治數據集〉,獲 香港研究資助局「人文學及社會科學傑出學者計劃」撥款 982,928 港元。

方博士是公共知識份子。他經常於媒體發表卓見和撰寫評論;同時熱心參與社會服務‧創辦和領導 多個民間團體。

Dr. FONG Chi-hang, Brian is Associate Director of The Academy of Hong Kong Studies at The Education University of Hong Kong.

Prior to joining the University (the then Hong Kong Institute of Education), Dr. Fong was previously Lecturer in the Division of Social Sciences of the City University of Hong Kong. Before joining the academia, Dr. Fong was an Executive Officer of the HKSAR Government from 2001 to 2007.

Dr. Fong's research interests include China's influences, territorial autonomies, democratization, governance and budgetary politics. He has published extensively in international peer-reviewed journals such as *Democratization, Nations and Nationalism, International Review of Administrative Sciences, China Quarterly, Modern China and Asian Survey*. Dr. Fong was awarded in 2019 "Humanities and Social Sciences Prestigious Fellowship" by the Research Grants Council of Hong Kong with funding of HKD982,928 for his project entitled "Comparative Territorial Autonomies: Exploring A New Comparative Politics Dataset".

Dr. Fong is a public intellectual. He is an active commentator for various media and regularly publishes commentaries. He is also very active in community services, founding and leading several civil society organizations.

Patrick Le Galès 教授現為法國巴黎政治大學城市學院院長 兼 CNRS 社會學和政治學研究教授。 Patrick LeGalès 教授在歐洲研究與比較政治中心的科學研究院擔任主席及主持著"城市重鎮"。他 是英國國家學術院院士‧歐洲科學院成員。《國際城市與區域研究》的前編輯‧SASE(高級社會經濟 學學會)的前任主席。

他曾在巴黎政治學院,牛津的納菲爾德大學(Mt.litt)和巴黎 X Nanterre 大學接受教育。他曾是加州 大學洛杉磯分校、倫敦國王學院、牛津大學納菲爾德學院、牛津大學馬克斯·普朗克社會研究學院、 米蘭比可卡大學、威尼斯大學、聖保羅大學墨西哥科萊喬、西北布魯塞爾研究所,以上學院的客座 教授或研究員。他是《歐洲社會學雜誌》的聯合編輯。

Prof Patrick Le Galès, Dean of The Urban School of Science Po and CNRS Research Professor of Sociology and Politics, at Sciences Po, Centre for European Studies and Comparative Politics and he chairs the "Cities are back in town" research group. He is a corresponding Fellow of the British Academy, a member of the Academia Europaea. He is a former editor of the International Journal of Urban and regional Research, a past president of SASE (Society for Advanced Socio economics).

He was educated at Sciences Po, Paris, Nuffield College Oxford (M.litt.) and the University of Paris X Nanterre. He was a visiting professor or researcher in particular at UCLA, King's College London, Nuffield College University of Oxford, the Max Planck Institute for the Study of Society in Cologne, the Universities of Milan Bicocca, Venise, the University of Sao Paolo, Colegio de Mexico, Brussels Studies Insitute, Northwestern. He is co-editor of the European Journal of Sociology.

李春玲教授現任中國社科院社會學研究所青少年與教育社會學研究室主任。她於中國社會科學院研究生院社會學系獲法學博士學位(1998)北京大學歷史系獲歷史學碩士學位(1987)。她的研究領域及興趣為社會分層與流動;教育社會學;青年研究。出版著作有:《斷裂與碎片——當代中國社會階層分化實證分析》、《社會分層理論》、《比較視野下的中產階級形成:過程、影響以及社會經濟後果》、《性別分層與勞動力市場》、《境遇、態度與社會轉型:80後青年的社會學研究》、《可持續發展教育:進展與挑戰》、《青年與社會變遷:中國和俄羅斯的比較研究》、The Rising Middle Classes in China 等。

Professor Li Chun-ling is currently the director of the Research Office of Youth and Educational Sociology, Institute of Sociology, Chinese Academy of Social Sciences. She received a Doctor of Laws degree from the Department of Sociology of the Graduate School of the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences (1998) and a Master of History degree from the Department of History of Peking University (1987). Her research fields and interests are social stratification and mobility; educational sociology; youth research. Publications include: "Fractures and Fragments: An Empirical Analysis of Social Stratification in Contemporary China", "Theory of Social Stratification", "The Formation of the Middle Class from a Comparative Perspective: Process, Influence, and Social Transformation: Sociological Research on Youth born in the 1980s", "Education for Sustainable Development: Progress and Challenges", "Youth and Social Changes: A Comparative Study of China and Russia", The Rising Middle Classes in China etc.



<u>Myungji Yang 博士</u> 夏威夷大學馬諾阿分校 副教授

<u>Dr Myungji Yang</u> Associate Professor, University of Hawaii at Manoa

Myungji Yang 博士是夏威夷大學馬諾阿分校政治學副教授。她於 2012 年在布朗大學獲得社會學博 士學位,並在 2015-16 年度在南加州大學韓國研究所的博士後工作了一年。她的研究興趣包括發展 的政治經濟學,階級政治和社會不平等,民主與公民社會,全球化和東亞。她在韓國城市中產階級 和民主方面的工作出現在《城市研究》,《社會學探究》,《亞洲批判研究》和《韓國觀察家》上。她 是《從奇蹟到海市晨樓:1960-2015 年韓國中產階級的成敗》的作者,於 2018 年在康奈爾大學出 版社出版。她目前在韓國從事右翼政治和激進主義的研究。在 2019-2020 學年期間,她是法國巴黎 MaxPo (Max Planck-Sciences Po 研究中心應對市場社會不穩定性的研究中心)的客座研究員。

Myungji Yang is an associate professor of political science at the University of Hawai'i, Mānoa and is currently a fellow at the Netherlands Institute for Advanced Study in the Humanities and Social Sciences (NIAS). She earned her PhD in Sociology from Brown University in 2012. Her research interests include the political economy of development, class politics and social inequality, democracy and civil society, globalization, and East Asia. Her work on the urban middle class and democracy in South Korea has appeared in *Urban Studies, Sociological Inquiry, Critical Asian Studies,* and *Korea Observer.* She is the author of *From Miracle to Mirage: The Making and Unmaking of the Korean Middle Class, 1960-2015*, published at Cornell University Press in 2018. She is currently working on right-wing politics and activism in South Korea from a comparative historical perspective.




<u>陳思賢教授</u> 新加坡國立大學李光耀公共政策學院 副教授

<u>Prof Kenneth Paul Tan</u> Associate Professor, Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy, National University of Singapore

陳思賢教授是新加坡國立大學(NUS)李光耀公共政策學院的終身副教授。在 2021 年 1 月,他將在 香港浸會大學擔任終身教授職位,該職位是根據其 Talent100 計劃聘用的。他在李光耀公共政策 學院發展急速,他曾擔任李光耀公共政策學院的副院長。多年來,他獲得了許多教學獎,包括新 加坡國立大學最負盛名的傑出教育家獎。他的著作包括《新加坡:身份,品牌,權力》(劍橋大學 出版社,2018 年),《全球治理新加坡:李光耀之後的遺產和未來》(Routledge,2017 年),《新 加坡電影和電視業:一維抵抗》(Brill,2008 年),新加坡文藝復興時期嗎?經濟,文化和政治 (國大出版社,2007 年)。他曾在澳大利亞國立大學,香港中文大學,喬治敦大學(獲得富布賴 特獎學金),哈佛大學,科學研究院和杜伊斯堡-埃森大學擔任訪問學者和教授職位。他是新加坡 國家藝術委員會藝術諮詢小組和新加坡國家博物館顧問委員會的成員。他主持劇院公司 The Necessary Stage(新加坡)的董事會。他是亞洲電影檔案館董事會的創始主席。

Kenneth Paul TAN is a tenured Associate Professor at the National University of Singapore's (NUS) Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy. In January 2021, he will be taking up a tenured Professorship at Hong Kong Baptist University, which has hired him under its Talent100 initiative. He was Vice Dean of the LKY School during the most rapid and critical years of its growth. He has received numerous teaching awards over the years, including NUS's most prestigious Outstanding Educator Award. His books include Singapore: Identity, Brand, Power (Cambridge University Press, 2018), Governing Global-City Singapore: Legacies and Futures After Lee Kuan Yew (Routledge, 2017), Cinema and Television in Singapore: Resistance in One Dimension (Brill, 2008), and Renaissance Singapore? Economy, Culture, and Politics (NUS Press, 2007). He has held visiting fellowships and professorships at the Australian National University, Chinese University of Hong Kong, Georgetown University (on a Fulbright Fellowship), Harvard University, Sciences Po, and the University of Duisburg-Essen. He is a member of the National Arts Council (Singapore)'s Arts Advisory Panel and the National Museum of Singapore's Advisory Board. He chairs the Board of Directors of theatre company The Necessary Stage (Singapore). He was the founding chair of the Asian Film Archive's Board of Directors.



<u>The Dialectics of Mobility and Immobility:</u> <u>Hong Kong's Professionals in the Context of Regional Integration</u>

Lui, Tai-lok (The Academy of Hong Kong Studies, The Education University of Hong Kong)

Conventional class analysis is conducted upon the assumption of social stratification within a national boundary (so a class structure normally refers to a system of class stratification in a national economy). But increasingly our social structure is impacted by the process of globalization, with flows of capital as well as people's movement frequently going beyond national borders. My presentation is an attempt to look at Hong Kong's professional sector in the context of regional integration. It is intended to answer two sets of question. First, it is about the effects of intensification of economic flows at the regional level, in the case of Hong Kong our attention focuses on the CEPA since 2013 and the more recent the Greater Bay Area Initiative, on class stratification. Particularly, we are interested in the impacts of such developments on the middle class. Second, I would also like to take this opportunity to reflect upon how we should approach the question of class stratification in global cities.

Explore the social position and role of Macao civil servants

O Lei Heong, Emily (PhD, Labor Economics, Renmin University of China)

The middle class is a research topic among a wide range of academic disciplines including sociology, politics, and anthropology. This article focuses on the public servants in Macao, mainly analyzing: (1) The social class structure and social status of the vast number of civil servants. Compared with other occupational groups, public servants owe favorable conditions from the prospects of politics, society and economy. They are classified as a crucial part of the middle class in Macao. (2) The characteristics of the public service group. With the rapid growth of economic, the costs of housing, education and living are increasing. Public functionaries are secured by golden and long-term salaries, which attracts Macao's well-educated young people to climb upwards so as to be one of the sections. (3) Whether and how public servants -can play a role in promoting social stability? Public servants are responsible to the SAR government, while performing their duties for the sake of Macao residents. They coordinate all kinds of social interests and appeals when formulating and implementing policies and decisions of the authorities, execute various launched policies and measures of the SAR government in a timely and effective fashion, and communicate within the internal government body to ensure the stability and development of our society, which constitutes its foremost responsibility and contribution.

Globalization and Its Discontents in Taiwan: What Did Middle Class Do?

Lin, Thung-Hong (Institute of Sociology, Academia Sinica)

In 2014, the Sunflower Movement, a student-led protest to oppose free trade to mainland China, shocked the public in Taiwan. The protesters claimed that open trade would favour large companies investing in China, damage local Small-Medium-scale Enterprises' (SMEs) business, and have a devaluing effect on local labour's wages. Observers believed that the movement empowered the Democratic Progressive Party (DPP), which won the national election in 2016. However, the failure of the DPP administration in the local elections of 2018 indicated a strong backfire of the populist politicians belonged to pan-KMT interest groups, which include some precarious workers in the tourist, catering and manufacture industry that still deeply depend on China. As my study of poverty and globalization showed, the increasing of population under the official poverty line were robustly associated with the trade dependence on China. If economic globalization, measured by Taiwan's trade openness to China, did damage the poor among different socio-economic groups, who suffered worst from it? Applying the Taiwan Social Change Survey, studies found that the youth and middle-aged unskilled workers suffered more than others from the "China Impact" under globalization. The increasing class inequality originated from globalization and deindustrialization fueled the populism with Taiwanese characteristics. On the contrary, middle class did turn back to the pan-KMT candidate and moderate the political polarization as the major supporters of President Tsai Ing-Wen. The case of Taiwan might shed lights on the pathway out of populism.

Rising Middle Class with muiti-facets in China: Growth and Challenge Li Chunling (Institute of Sociology, CASS)

Fast economic growth and social development over the past decades have been creating a Chinese middle class. But what is the middle class or who are the members of middle class? This question remains no clear answer. Sociologists, economists, political scientists, market analysts, government experts and public media all propose their concepts of middle class. At least three major kinds of concepts are used to describe Chinese middle class: occupational middle class, wealth middle class, and middle income group. Each concept reflects a certain aspect or subgroups of Chinese middle class. Chinese middle class is a mixture of different subgroups and various elements. As a new emerging class, its boundary with other classes is not clear. It shows a feature with multi-facets. In today's China, not only one middle class but there are middle classes. All middle classes have benefited from fast economic growth over the past decades. However, under increasing domestic economic risk and political pressure from abroad, all these middle classes are facing challenges: increasingly economic risks and uncertainties, slowdown in income growth, and worry about their social and economic security. How to cope with these problems and challenges, enhance the ability of the middle classes to resist economic risks and make the middle classes continues to grow, is an important issue that governments need to consider carefully.

<u>A Tale of Two Middle Classes: Homeownership, Wealth Accumulation Strategies, and</u> <u>Increasing Fragmentation of the Middle Class</u>

Dr Myungji Yang (University of Hawaii at Manoa)


This paper explores the increasing fragmentation and differentiation within the middle class in South Korea: the well-off professional, upper middle class and the precarious lower middle class. Existing literature on the middle class in developed countries mainly focuses on the aspect of the decline of the middle class by emphasizing the role of neoliberalism and job insecurity. While precarious employment and massive layoffs are commonly studied as central causes of massive downward class mobility in South Korea, I argue that this is only the half of the reality. Focusing on the housing and real estate market in South Korea, I analyze how middle-class citizens with different resources navigate their strategies of homeownership, and how it in turn shapes their future life chances and financial conditions. While the high-income, professional groups can afford to buy a home in decent neighborhoods and take advantage of rapidly increasing real estate values, the rest of the middle class struggles to buy one due to ever-increasing housing prices. By documenting how existing disparities exacerbated housing inequality within the middle class, this paper enhances an understanding of the relationship between the middle class, housing, and social inequality.

The Political Significance of Singapore's Middle Class

Prof Kenneth Paul Tan (Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy, National University of Singapore)


Singapore society - affluent, consumerist, and politically apathetic - has been described as broadly middle-class, a signifier of successful development and progress, but also a counterargument against theories that identify the middle class as both the outcome of economic growth as well as a driver of liberal democratisation. As a neoliberal global city, Singapore is confronted today by the increasingly complex challenges of inequality at many levels. At one end of this middle-class society is an emergent Singaporean underclass whose wages and life prospects are being depressed by competition from a large inflow of low-waged migrant workers from the region. At the other end is a sub-class of professionals, managers, executives, and technicians (PMETs) whose prospects have been diminished by intersecting factors that include liberal policies to attract competitive "foreign talent", the longer-term disruptive trends associated with the "fourth industrial revolution", and the severe impact of COVID-19 on the economy and, in particular, jobs. This paper will discuss the renewed political significance of Singapore's middle class in these troubled times.
