
加入教大(前身香港教育學院)前, 呂教授曾任香港大學社會學系教授, 期間並出任社會科學院副院長(2010-2011)及社會學系系主任(2011-2014)。他亦曾任教於香港城市理工學院(1986-1988)及香港中文大學(1988-2009)。呂教授早年畢業於香港大學, 取得文學學士及社會學哲學碩士學位, 期後於英國牛津大學取得哲學碩士及博士學位。

呂教授的研究範疇廣泛,涵蓋階級分析、經濟社會學、城市社會學和 香港社會研究等領域。他一直熱心參與社會事務,除擔任多個與社會 服務有關的志願機構的委員外,亦有出任政府及專業團體的委員會的 工作。

Professor LUI Tai-lok is Chair Professor of Hong Kong Studies and Director of The Academy of Hong Kong Studies at The Education University of Hong Kong.

Prior to joining the University (the then Hong Kong Institute of Education), he was Professor at The University of Hong Kong (HKU) where he also took up the position of Associate Dean at the Faculty of Social Sciences (2010-2011) and the headship of the Department of Sociology (2011-2014). He has taught at Hong Kong City Polytechnic (1986-88) and The Chinese University of Hong Kong (1988-2009). Professor Lui obtained his B.A. and M.Phil. in Sociology at the HKU and then a Master of Philosophy and a Doctor of Philosophy from Oxford University.

Professor Lui has widely researched and published in topics including class analysis, economic sociology, urban sociology, and Hong Kong society. He also actively contributes to the Hong Kong community by serving on various committees in governmental and professional bodies as well as those related to social services over the years.

Professor Stephen CHIU obtained his doctorate from Princeton University and is currently Chair Professor in the Department of Social Sciences, and Co-Director, The Academy of Hong Kong Studies, The Education University of Hong Kong.

His research interests include development studies, industrial relations, social movements, youth studies, and the comparative study of the East Asian region. Dr Wendy Hong joined the Fung Business Intelligence Centre (利豐研究中心) as a Vice President in early 2013. Her research covers a variety of areas, including business model innovations, global supply chain trends, China's cities and city clusters, China's macroeconomic trends, Mainland-Hong Kong economic cooperation, and other issues concerning the Group's business strategies in China. She also drafts speeches for Group Chairman to address external functions and conferences, and manages relationship with external parities including government and business institutions in the Mainland and Hong Kong.

Dr Hong previously served for more than five years as a Senior Researcher in the Central Policy Unit (中央政策組) of the Hong Kong SAR Government, where she conducted policy research on macrosocioeconomic issues and trends in Mainland China and Mainland-Hong Kong economic cooperation. Her tasks also included writing speeches for top government officials and help liaison with governments departments and think tanks in the Mainland.

In her social capacity, Dr Hong has been teaching at the Civil Service Training and Development Institute of the Hong Kong SAR Government since 2014, giving lectures on China's macroeconomic trends and issues, China's city clusters, etc. She is currently a member of the Guangdong-HK-Macau Greater Bay Area Task Force and the Belt and Road Working Group of the Hong Kong General Chamber of Commerce. She also served as a Special Advisor to the Trade and Industry Department of the Hong Kong SAR Government and a Staff Officer of the Greater Pearl River Delta Business Council.

Dr Hong has published widely in professional journals, edited volumes, newspapers and magazines. She has also been involved as a speaker in different events.

Dr Hong holds a PhD from the University of Hong Kong. She received her Master and Bachelor degrees from Tongji University in Shanghai.

He has published in *Journal of Chinese Governance, Journal of Asian Public Policy, Asian Survey* and *Chine Review* among other journals. He is the editor of Macau Twenty Years after the Handover (Routledge, 2020).

Previously, he worked as Senior Research Fellow of HKIAPS and Co-Director of APEC Study Centre of CUHK, Senior Research Fellow of Fung Global Institute, Senior Economist of the Hong Kong Government, Senior Economist of the Planning Department of HSBC, Regional Research Director of Banker Trust Securities Ltd, and Research Director and Chief Economist of Hong Kong Policy Research Institute. He participated actively in public services for many years, including National Member of the Chinese People's Political Consultative Conference (1994-2013), Member of Hong Kong Legislative Council (1995-1998) and Member of the District Council (1994-2007). Dr. Law received his Bachelor Degree of Social Science (Economics) from CUHK and PhD (Economics) from the University of California (Los Angeles).

Professor James FARRER Professor of Sociology Global Studies | Director of the Graduate Program in Global Studies Sophia University

James Farrer is Professor of Sociology and Global Studies and Director of the Graduate Program in Global Studies at Sophia University in Tokyo. His research focuses on the contact zones of global cities, including ethnographic studies of sexuality, nightlife, expatriate communities, and urban food cultures. Recent publications include *International Migrants in China's Global City: The New Shanghailanders, Shanghai Nightscapes: A Nocturnal Biography of a Global City* (with Andrew Field), and *Globalization and Asian Cuisines: Transnational Networks and Contact Zones.* Originally from the United States, he completed his PhD in Sociology at the University of Chicago has lived in Asia most of his adult life.



論文摘要 Abstracts of Papers

Explore Hong Kong's New Path towards "Localized Globalization" Dr Wendy HONG (Legislative Council)

Globalization has been the fundamental driving force of the development and evolution of Hong Kong since its inception as an entrepôt. In response to shifting globalization trends over the past decades, Hong Kong has gone through a number of restructuring processes. The most recent restructuring since 2000 has greatly strengthened Hong Kong's role as an international financial center and amplified its global functions. It has become one of the few Global Cities in the world, and was included in a neologism"Nylonkong", linking three cities, New York, London, and Hong Kong as they were seen as the key nodes that formed a global network facilitating the globalization.

However, in tandem with such a transformation, the city has been heading toward a model of "Rootless Globalization"(離地全球化), where its global functions are disconnected with local development, and industries intimately linked to real economy are hollowing out. The results are severe polarization in society and shrinking upward social mobility.

Since the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic, strict mobility restrictions imposed by the government have weakened Hong Kong's international competitiveness, diminishing its fame as "Nylonkong".

It is urgent for Hong Kong to explore a new path towards globalization. This new path does not mean abandoning globalization; rather, it means enhancing the local dimension while restoring Hong Kong's global openness and restrengthening its international competitiveness. Hong Kong's international functions should not only serve the interaction between the East and the West, but also serve local demands and improve the

lives of local people---such is a new paradigm of "localized globalization"(在地全球化) that I'm trying to explore on the platform of Legislative Council.




Shanghai's "Third Coming" as a Global City

Professor James FARRER (Sophia University)

Shanghai in the 1990s regained its status as China's premier global city, rapidly increasing the cross-border flows of investment, trade, human mobility, and cultural exchanges that define a global city in economic, social, and cultural terms. This globality also has a historical dimension. Historian Jeffrey Wasserstrom wrote of the "second coming" of Shanghai as a global city (2003). Shanghainese celebrated a cosmopolitan cultural identity that hearkened back to Shanghai's Treaty Port century (1841-1943). Most notably, after 2000 Shanghai began incorporating hundreds of thousands of business migrants and students from developed countries into its economic, social, and cultural life. In the 2000s Shanghai's foreign population reached levels not seen since the 1930s, and even these globetrotting "expatriates" began celebrating Shanghai as a global metropolis (Farrer 2019). COVID-19 however has led to a sharp contraction in all the economic, social, and cultural dimensions of Shanghai's globality. It is an open question as to when and how Shanghai's global city status will recover, and what this "third coming" of Shanghai as a global city will look like. This talk will discuss Shanghai's global culture from an ethnographic perspective, using research on Shanghai's expatriate communities and cosmopolitan consumer culture before COVID to discuss the economic, social, and cultural dimensions of global city status. It outlines what ethnographic urban studies can tell us about what makes a global city.
