Part II

The University's Graduate Attributes and seven Generic Intended Learning Outcomes (GILOs) represent the attributes of ideal EdUHK graduates and their expected qualities respectively. Learning outcomes work coherently at the University (GILOs), programme (Programme Intended Learning Outcomes) and course (Course Intended Learning Outcomes) levels to achieve the goal of nurturing students with important graduate attributes.

In gist, the Graduate Attributes for Sub-degree, Undergraduate, Taught Postgraduate, Professional Doctorate and Research Postgraduate students consist of the following three domains (i.e. in short "PEER & I"):

- Professional Excellence;
- Ethical Responsibility; &
- Innovation.

The descriptors under these three domains are different for the three groups of students in order to reflect the respective level of Graduate Attributes.

The seven GILOs are:

2. Critical Thinking Skills
3. Creative Thinking Skills
- 4a. Oral Communication Skills
- 4b. Written Communication Skills
5. Social Interaction Skills
6. Ethical Decision Making
7. Global Perspectives

1. Course Synopsis

This course aims to equip students with the essential knowledge and skills necessary for managing non-governmental organizations (NGOs). Beginning with an overview of the nature and variety of NGOs, it will then discuss a number of practical issues relating to the establishment and operation of an NGO, e.g., defining its mission, choosing the suitable legal entity, constituting an NGO board, financial management, capacity building, and developing and deploying effective solutions to social and environmental issues. Further, some ethical and governance problems commonly found in NGOs will be examined.

2. Course Intended Learning Outcomes (CILOs)

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- CILO₁ Describe the nature and types of NGOs, and evaluate critically their roles in local and global communities;
- CILO₂ Explain the requirements and procedures of setting up NGOs with a sound governance structure;
- CILO₃ Identify common ethical and governance challenges facing NGOs, devise effective and creative strategies to solve them;
- CILO₄ Acquire practical knowledge and skills in NGO works (e.g. budget planning, application for government grants, and developing collaborative projects for innovative solutions.).
